## September guest speaker

#### **Brad Argent of Ancestry.com.au**

Brad will be our speaker at the General Meeting at 2:00pm on Thursday 27 September.

He will go through some of the more interesting collections on the Ancestry.com.au site and promises to provide some tips and tricks for finding what you want.

Brad is Content Director for the Ancestry.com.au



website and is responsible for identifying, acquiring and publishing content for the Australian and New Zealand markets. He says that the best part of his job is finding the stories in the content and the worst part is having to let them go. His own family history is peppered with a healthy mix of convicts and free settlers mostly from the UK. Brad has a background in information technology, online advertising and consultancy. Brad has been with the ancestry site since February 2007.

#### **Background information**

Ancestry.com.au is part of a global network of Ancestry websites, which include Ancestry.co.uk in the UK, Ancestry.com in the U.S., Ancestry.ca in Canada, Ancestry.de in Germany, Ancestry.it in Italy, Ancestry.se in Sweden, and Ancestry.fr in France.

Ancestry.com is the world's largest online resource for family history, with approximately 2 million paying subscribers around the world as of July 2012. Since starting as a publishing company in 1983, it has been a leader in the family history market for over 20 years and has helped pioneer the market for online family history research.

It believes that most people have a fundamental desire to understand who they are and from where they came, and that anyone interested in discovering, preserving and sharing their family history is a potential user of Ancestry.com. It strives to make its service valuable to individuals ranging from the most committed family historians to those taking their first steps towards satisfying their curiosity about their family stories.

## Society's Image Library now online

In keeping with our aim to make this collection more widely accessible, we recently applied for a grant of \$3,300 from the IMB Community Foundation to purchase an image library module for our photo cataloguing program, Perfect Pictures.

Last week, our new Online Image Library went 'live' -

a real red-letter day for the volunteers at the archives who have been working so hard to scan photographs and transfer information to our photograph catalogue.

The Society's photographic collection numbers in excess of 8,000 images. Many of these images are unique, dating from the 1870s onwards. Our World War I Berrima German Internment Camp collection has been assessed as nationally significant by the National Library of Australia and is the largest of its type held by any repository in Australia.

The German Internment Camp photographic collection includes more than 400 images, taken both by the internees themselves and local professional photographers.

The Society was delighted to receive the grant from the IMB Community Foundation for the software which will allow us to upload our entire collection to the internet, making it available not just to the local community but worldwide.

This is particularly important for the German Internment Camp collection given that the majority of

the internees returned to Germany after the war and most of their descendants, and indeed the wider historical community, would have no idea of the existence of this amazing photographic record in our small archive in regional New South Wales.

Access to the Image Library is through our website www.berrimadistricthistoricalsociety.org.au

At this stage, we are still in a trial mode, with very few photographs online. However, over the next few weeks you will see the collection gradually growing as we complete catalogue entries and upload new batches of images.



There is a link on our Home Page to the Image Library - just click on it to go to the search page, which is very easy to navigate and use. The images on the internet are very small files, so suitable only as reference copies. Anyone wishing to purchase high quality images can do so directly from the website through our Online Shop and pay for them using Paypal.

We have been working towards making our photographic collection more accessible for some time and it is very exciting for us in the archives to be reaching our goal. Our images will now be available to the world – so do go and have a look. You never know what you might find!


## **Gladys Stokes and Claude Lee**

#### A local marriage of love and music

Claude Newton Lee was born in 1884 at Mittagong and in 1913 he married Gladys Stokes, daughter of Joshua Stokes, a prominent Bowral businessman and alderman.

Their union was to prove incredibly fruitful. Both had musical talent and a love of music and theatre and made their home a centre for artistic endeavour.

Claude was an incredibly energetic and capable man who took a leading part in social, public and community activities in the district. With great vision and a love of life, he was described as a man who dared to be different.



He lived his whole life at Leslie Cottage, a stone house in Queen Street,

Mittagong, where he had been born and it was in that gracious home that he and his wife Gladys enjoyed every minute of their 60 years of marriage.

Claude's father Fred Lee was a stonemason who emigrated from England in the mid-1800s to join his brother Joseph and carry on their trade as stonemasons. They are believed to have worked on the railway bridge at Picton in the 1860s. They also are said to have constructed a small gaol at the bottom of Catherine Hill, Yerrinbool that served as a stop-over point for prisoners being taken to Berrima Gaol. More significantly, they were the stonemasons who built the elegant St Stephen's Church of England in Mittagong.

In about 1870 Joseph also built the stone cottage in

Queen Street and lived there until his death in 1886, two years after his son Claude was born.



Gladys was the daughter of Joshua

Stokes who in turn was one of 13 children born to John and Elizabeth Stokes who emigrated in various stages from England and settled in Bowral.

Joshua was aged 19 when he arrived in Bowral in 1882 and in 1886 commenced his own business as a



carrier produce and merchant that over the years met with much success. He was always active in movements aimed at advancing the town and was devoted to furthering music, interests of local instrumental and vocal groups, including the Bowral Band and the Choral Society.

His talent and love of

music flowed on to his children, and his daughter Gladys became an assistant organist at St Jude's and, for some years, was accompanist for the Bowral Choral Society.

Her husband Claude was an exceptional musician who could play practically every instrument in a brass band and from a young age he was a member of both the Mittagong and Bowral town bands.

Besides this, Claude was Shire Clerk for Nattai Shire Council from its inception in 1906 and from 1939 when it amalgamated with Mittagong Municipal Council. Serving for almost forty years, he brought to the profession a local flair and independence unknown since.

His marriage to Gladys in 1913 would have resulted from their shared musical interest which continued throughout their married life. When the Bowral Choral Society staged 'Merrie England' in 1934, participants included Mrs Alf Stephens, Mrs W E Stokes and rehearsals were held at Claude and Gladys' home.

When Joshua Stokes bought the Bowral Empire Theatre in 1934 he hired son-in-law Claude in 1935 to be its enterprising manager. After the death of Joshua, Claude continued to manage the theatre on behalf of the estate until 1958, when new owners took over.

Molly Fraser, a former Empire employee, reminisced that while Claude was the manager, the theatre was a vibrant and vital meeting place.

One of Claude's many other life-long interests was bushwalking and he traversed all parts of the Nattai, lower Wollondilly and Warragamba areas. His love of Old Burragorang and its people stirred him to publish 'A Place to Remember' in 1971, a memorial book to the wild and remote ruggedness that disappeared under water when the Warragamba Dam was built.

Claude also had a long association with sport in the district, mainly rugby league, and served in official capacities for the Mittagong club and as press correspondent – the local paper carried many nittygritty articles written by Claude.

As well he was a historian and writer of hundreds of poems. According to Haille Paine, one of his local contemporaries, as a historian Claude had a wide and intimate knowledge of the various inns, buildings and other landmarks of the district including the Mittagong ironworks.

Claude died peacefully in his sleep in 1973 at Bowral Hospital, just 3 months after the death of his beloved wife. His only son, Bob, said that Claude simply lost his reason to live.

Here is one of Claude's many poems:

#### **BE PREPARED**

Sad Autumns here, the air grows chill The sun sinks early oe'r the hill The joints and voices of the old Creak out complaints about the cold.

When we've the need of cheering most No comfort greets us in the post. To heap more sorrows on our ills Now we get a pile of bills.

As good old SoI his warmth abates The Council duns us for the rates As hoar frost takes the place of dew Accounts for electricity are due.

Still they'll not leave us alone But send a whopper for the phone As summer joys aside are laid We're overwhelmed with bills unpaid.

Just when we think we've paid them all No more creditors recall Greet the Postie with assurance There'll be one for the insurance!

Then you might well pause and think If any's left to buy a drink It is quite enough to send A fellow off the deepest end.

As for me, I'm certain sure, Preventions better far than cure So before the troubles come I get a stock of OP rum.

Thus it is without avail I'm pestered in the morning mail Life is happier no doubt With the motto of the scout

"Be prepared"


An extra piece on Claude Lee by John McColgan.

Claude wrote some notes on the old Fitzroy Iron Works' blast furnace that was still standing in 1927 being rather disgusted that it was not preserved for posterity. In his own words:

"The ancient structure best remembered by me was the famous blast furnace where iron was first smelted in Australia. It was the last to be demolished because the vandal residents could not pull it down, it was too solid and withstood the onslaughts of those who roamed the old works for bricks, stone, ashes, slag and scraps of iron. The firebricks with which the tower-like structure was lined were very popular and soon became scarce. One massive corner was nibbled away at until it was supported by only a few inches width of brickwork. Its weakness became its protection until the spoilers complained of the danger of allowing it to remain."

Eventually the remains of the blast furnace were sold for demolition for 20 pounds and ended up being used to build several cottages.

Claude made no comment on the inaction of the authorities in permitting this destruction – as he said it would not be complimentary. It should be noted that even though Claude was Shire Clerk of Nattai Shire he could not influence the decision as the iron works site was within the town area under the control of the Mittagong Municipal Council.






(top) the blast furnace being cleaned out in 1880s; (above) a picnic in 1913 at the abandoned works.

#### Publication of the month: a review

"Guest Houses in Bundanoon - a history of people and place"

#### New edition now available

Bundanoon was an easy steam-train ride from Sydney and became a favourite destination from the 1880s when guest houses first opened. The mountain air was cool, clear and stimulating and the views magnificent. Innumerable school holidays, honeymoons and relaxed weekends were spent at the guest houses, some of which could accommodate up to 130 quests.



Mittagong, Bowral and Moss Vale, also located on the southern railway, became holiday destinations but did not offer much in the way of attractions. The spectacular natural scenery readily accessible from what grew as the village of Bundanoon was unique to the area and excited much interest.

In 1989 the Bundanoon History Group published a history of the guest houses and a second edition in 1998 proved very popular, especially with people who could recall happy holidays spent at Bundanoon in the guest houses described, and also with family historians looking for information about the places their ancestors stayed or worked.

Since that edition was published, however, new information and images of the guest houses have been provided by former guests and from the families of guest house owners. Also the greater availability of historical sources on the internet has enabled better understanding of the period.

In order to incorporate these added dimensions, a dedicated group of Bundanoon History Group volunteers spent considerable time updating guest house information to produce a revised and enlarged third edition. This new edition, called 'Guest Houses in Bundanoon - a history of people and place' is now available for purchase.

Readers familiar with the earlier editions will notice that some entries have been deleted and others expanded considerably.

The Bundanoon History Group is grateful to Wingecarribee Shire Council for a grant under its 2011/12 Community Assistance Scheme that enabled the production of this edition.

This new edition is available at a cost of \$12 from the Society's Archives in Mittagong and the museum in Berrima or may be ordered through our website bdhsarchives@gmail.com.

It is also available from the Post Office, Newsagent, Good Yarn shop and other Bundanoon outlets or by mail from Bundanoon History Group, PO Box 180 Bundanoon 2578.

In conjunction with the revised edition, a display has been mounted at the Old Goods Shed in Bundanoon consisting of images of the guest houses and the people that ran them. On display also are items and objects from the guest house heyday including china, glassware and linen.

The Old Goods Shed is located near the railway station and is open from 10 till 3pm on the first and third Sunday of each month. Well worth a visit to view the historical display on 'Guest Houses in Bundanoon - a history of people and place' and to purchase a copy of the book.
